When the Shag became popular again (after the disco dances, about 20 years ago) Berk and I frequented the clubs such as the Steak and Ale, Groucho's, Boopers and The Legend in Charlotte.

We were always anxious (and still are) to attend all the shag events like S.O.S., Our Time, Golden Oldies, Shag Attack, and events given by the various shag clubs around the Southeast.

In 1993, I was honored to be elected to the Living Legends, and we have enjoyed associating with all our many wonderful friends in the shagging scene. No other group of people are as congenial or as much fun as Shaggers. They are the best!

Rhythm and timing are everything in the shag, and no one loves to shag better than I do. Let's keep the fun in Shagging and keep it alive.
